

BUDGET 2023 CONSULTATION 2026

YOU SAID, WE DID

East Renfrewshire Council carried out its largest public consultation event in November 2022 that informed the Council's budget setting for the next three years. This is a summary of the key concerns that you raised and the steps that have been taken to address them.

- Live Active GP Referral and Vitality Health & Wellbeing programmes are running again in partnership with the HSCP providing free access to Vitality classes for more vulnerable residents
- Eastwood High School changing area has undergone refurbishment giving capacity to increase the swimming programme by 900 participants
