APPROVAL OF MINUTE OF	The Chairperson proposed the minute of 3 <sup>rd</sup> October as a true record of the meeting, seconded by John Morrison.
MEETINGS	Andrew Reid provided a minute of the formal part of the meeting on 3 <sup>rd</sup> October, this was proposed by the Chairperson and seconded by John Morrison.

POLICE REPORT	The Police were unable to attend the meeting and sent apologies.
	PS Fiona McGuffie emailed a copy (extract below) of the monthly police report for the MECC area for the period 7 <sup>th</sup> October to 7 <sup>th</sup> November 2023.
	"Crime levels in your community council area remain low in the past month.
	Ongoing issues with youth disorder continue to be a priority for your local community policing team.
	It is asked that constituents are reminded of the importance of home and property security and it is urged that any suspicious behaviour is reported to Police. The community's continued engagement allows us to tailor the best policing response to the community.
	One person was reported for drug offences in your area during this time.
	One instance of shoplifting were reported in your



local area.

- One instance was reported of theft of a motor vehicle.
- One instance of vandalism was reported during this time.
- Two instances of attempted housebreaking were reported during this time with one being to a commercial premises.

We have seen a decrease in criminality and youth disorder at The Avenue during this time and this continues to be a focus for us as we work alongside the staff there.

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Motion to start meetings at 7.00pm	The Chairperson proposed the motion that our meetings should start earlier at 7.00pm. All members present voted unanimously to the change of start time.	
CO-OPTION OF STEVE RUTHERFORD	The Chairperson proposed the Co-option of Steve Rutherford, seconded by the Secretary.  In his absence all the MECC members present voted unanimously to accept Steve Rutherford's Co-option. MAIDENHILL FOOTPATH	Cllr. Edlin advised he has put pressure on CALA and ERC and has received an agreement from ERC to establish exactly what the problem is so it can be resolved properly.  Cllr Anderson advised the lighting is now working along the whole path. The Mearnskirk Owners Association had been in touch with John Adams at ERC and the lights were switched on at the end of October.  Bollards are also going to be installed to prevent motors accessing the lane and being used as a route for getaway vehicles.  Further to recent MECC correspondence with CALA, the Chairperson received a response from Lynn Young (Land Co-ordinator) and Graham T McNeil (Land Director) at CALA, who agreed that the path is of a poor standard and has undertaken that they will correct the situation.  An extract from the letter below:  "It is recognised that a section of the path has not been installed in accordance with the proposed design in terms of both alignment and gradient. The consortium (of which CALA forms part) have escalated this with the nominated contractor to resolve in the first instance, at the earliest.  By way of some background, our records show that the path was never designed to be adopted as it was not originally designated to be a safe route to school.  With remedial works therefore pending, CALA are intending to keep this path open. If there is an unexpected or unavoidable delay in the works commencing, we will give fuller consideration to temporary closure of the path until such time as the remedial works are completed." The Chairperson agreed to write to John Adams (ERC) and the CALA Director to ask for a definitive timeframe for improvements to be made prior to the winter setting in.

CALA have an agreement with ERC – if they do not comply then ERC can impose sanctions.

Maidenhill residents complained that although bins have been installed along the path, they are not being emptied. Dog poo bags are piling up beside the bins.

Residents are concerned that if there is an accident on the path who is responsible?

Residents were advised to write formal letters and email them to their factor to resolve this issue.

David Buchanan - Chair of Sub Committee, Broom Park Exercise Equipment update:

David Buchanan and William Maxwell distributed 150 copies of the questionnaire around households adjacent to Broom Park

There have only been 16 responses

13 In Favour and 3 Against

Three quotes have been received out of the four companies contacted.

The quotations received ranged from the best at £29,000 to most costly £34,000.

There are various grants which can be applied for but the MECC is expected to raise/fund some of the cost.

The big question is whether we should proceed, or come up with another idea.

The exercise equipment already installed in Rouken Glen park is used infrequently and it was questioned if this would be the best use of any funding raised.

ON 20MPH TRAFFIC ZONES	Newton Mearns South has the highest percentage of car ownership in East Renfrewshire with over 54% of

	households owning two or more cars.	
	The majority of trips undertaken are between 5k and 10k which would equate to at least a 45 minute walk.	
	Within East Renfrewshire cycling is mainly seen as a leisure activity. Walking is seen as a utility and leisure activity.	
	Many people find cycling unsafe due to traffic and road conditions.	
	The wet weather doesn't help.	
	There are 74 controlled traffic zones planned to be installed over all of East Renfrewshire across the next five years. Details of the location of each area are currently not available. At present three zones are planned in our area during the next financial year.	
	The basic message is that reducing speed increases pedestrian safety.	
	Cllr. Edlin stated that the majority of his constituents are not in favour of walking everywhere.	
	It would be useful to discover if there is any data available about accidents in the school areas.	
	There are already safe zones around schools.

## **Consultation on Glasgow City Centre**

Residents, businesses, and organisations are being invited to have their say on proposals to take Glasgow city centre forward into the next decade.

With an increased focus on the future of town and city centres, the consultation on the City Centre Strategy will give Glaswegians the opportunity to shape Scotland's most important economic area, including creating more jobs, providing better transport options and increasing the residential population.

The consultation runs from 13<sup>th</sup> Oct 2023 until 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2023

Cllr Edlin to write to the environment department to ask if some can be installed.

#### **Nitrous Oxide**

James found 16 large canisters of Nitrous Oxide in Broom Park and contacted the police.

From 8<sup>th</sup> November 2023, national legislation will be introduced by Westminster making this an illegal substance.

Penalty for possession will be up to 2 years imprisonment.

Penalty with possession to supply or trading of nitrous oxide cannisters – up to 14 years imprisonment together with unlimited fines.

The problem in Scotland is that under Devolution, part of the legislation comes under Westminster and part Edinburgh legislation.

In Scotland, because nitrous oxide is not classed as a controlled substance, it is not routinely screened for in toxicology tests.

The Scottish Government said that, given the reserved nature of the Psychoactive Substances Act 2016, it had not pursued any discussions on the issue with retailers.

The number of reported deaths are very few and no records are available within Scotland after 2020 (National Records Office). Nitrous Oxide is mainly used by youths in our area and can be purchased easily on the internet.

If we find any of these cannisters on our litter picks we should report them to the Police.
